VA Rating Table:

Rating	Explanation
0%	Cholecystectomy performed, but no ongoing symptoms. Digestive function is normal and no medication required.
10%	Mild symptoms post-removal such as occasional abdominal discomfort, bloating, or mild diarrhea managed by diet.
30%	Severe symptoms post-cholecystectomy including continuous abdominal pain, frequent diarrhea, or other digestive dysfunction despite medical management.

Required Evidence:

- Surgical history showing cholecystectomy
- Medical records showing post-op complications (diarrhea, cramping, indigestion)
- Treatment history: diet changes, antacids, bile salt binders
- Personal statements about flare-ups or ongoing pain
- Gastroenterologist or primary care follow-up notes

Pro Tip:

Even if the surgery was successful, document any recurring pain or GI distress. If you take daily antidiarrheals or have food restrictions, this supports a higher rating.
